Notes

- Students may be required to take additional language courses depending on the entry qualification in English/Chinese.
- Major and college requirements should not exceed 72 credits. However, colleges and schools may set a higher limit to meet professional accreditation requirements.
- Students admitted with advanced standing will not be entitled to additional credit transfer on the basis of their entry qualifications. Instead, students may apply for course exemption based on prior study. Credit units are not earned for an exempted course.

Languages for All

All courses at CityU are conducted in English unless they are Chinese or other language courses. CityU offers a range of language courses including Cantonese, Putonghua (Mandarin), Japanese, Korean, Spanish, French and German.

Discovery-enriched Curriculum (DEC)

The goal of DEC is for all students to have the opportunity to make an original discovery – a discovery, innovation or creative project that represents new knowledge in their field.

Colleges & Schools




Hong Kong is one of the most cosmopolitan regions of the Asia-Pacific region. The **College of Business** has long-standing relationships with partner on the mainland and in Hong Kong's business circles, which ensure the city maintains its competitive edge. The college is one of the few premier business schools in the Greater China region to be triple accredited, having been recognised by AMBA, AACSB International and EQUIS.



The University is committed to conducting social science research that addresses critical social issues. The humanities expand our understanding of human conditions and the development of human values.

The establishment of the State Key Laboratory of Millimetre Waves and State Key Laboratory in Marine Pollutions is further proof of the research strengths of the University.







CityU's **School of Creative Media** plays a central role in providing the talent that forges this well-earned reputation. The jewel in the crown of creative media education at CityU is the state-of-the-art Run Run Shaw Creative Media Centre designed by renowned architect Daniel Libeskind. This striking landmark is a focal point for the development of creative media in Asia.



The recently established School of Energy and Environment is the first in Hong Kong and one of the few in the region to lead teaching and research tackling two of the most pressing issues of our time. The school is committed to improving environmental quality and support sustainable development in Greater China and the Asia-Pacific region. Its Biofuel Research Centre, also the first of its kind in Hong Kong, addresses the rising global demand for sustainable fuels.



The School of Law aspires to be an internationally renowned centre for research and the teaching of law. The school distinguishes itself with its strong commitment to common law scholarship and to comparative and international law scholarship, with an emphasis on Chinese law. The groundbreaking Hong Kong Centre for Maritime and Transportation Law aims to nurture maritime and transportation legal professionals in support of Hong Kong's continued development as a maritime service centre.








CityU Campus




